Population – Warrington

Estimated population: Ward population were estimated from the ONS Census 2021 (based on the resident population as at 21st March 2021). Wards range from 6,212 residents in Burtonwood and Winwick to 12,415 in Poplars and Hulme.

Population structure: The age structure of the population affects a range of service needs. Some wards have a much older population than the Warrington average, and some a much younger population. Overall Warrington is similar to national figures and the North West, in 2021, **18% were aged 0-15, 63% aged 16-64, and 19% aged 65+**.

Looking at specific younger age groups, in Warrington approximately 5% of the population were aged 0-4. By ward, the highest proportion of 0-4s can be found in Latchford East (6.8%), Bewsey and Whitecross (6.8%) and Fairfield and Howley (6.4%) and Poplars and Hulme (6.4%).


In Warrington approximately **22% of the population were aged 0-19**. The ward estimates for this age group ranges from 17.3% (Latchford West) to 28.0% (Poplars and Hulme).

The proportion of those **aged 80 and older** in Warrington is approximately **5.0%.** Wards with a higher proportion of these oldest populations include Penketh and Cuerdley (9.8%), Burtonwood and Winwick (7.9%), Lymm South (7.3%) and Culcheth, Glazebury and Croft (7.2%).


Population projections show that Warrington's population is forecast to increase to 214,000 by 2030.

Households: Warrington has approximately 98,300 residential properties as at June 2023, with the largest numbers in Bewsey and Whitecross (7,430) and Fairfield and Howley (6,145) and the smallest numbers in Poulton South (2,796) and Westbrook (2,731).


Population – Bewsey and Whitecross

Compared to Warrington's population structure there are:

- Higher proportions of the youngest age groups (0 to 9) and age groups 20 to 44 years old.
- Lower proportions of the population aged 10-19 as well as those aged 50 and older.

Warrington's population: The latest population estimate from the Census (2021) for Warrington is 210,956. Projections show that Warrington's population is forecast to increase to 214,000 by 2030.



Deprivation


Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) 2019

The map shows the spread of deprivation across Warrington along with the ward boundaries. The most deprived areas are shaded blue, tend to be in inner Warrington, and the least deprived shaded green, in outer Warrington.

Lower Super Output Areas (LSOAs) are small geographical units. Deprivation is measured using the Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) 2019. For each LSOA, a deprivation score is calculated covering a broad range of issues: income, employment, health and disability, education and skills, housing and services, crime, and living environment. There are wide inequalities between people living in areas of high levels of deprivation and those living in areas of low deprivation; more deprived populations generally have poorer outcomes in terms of health, education etc.

All 127 LSOAs in Warrington are ordered by IMD score and have been split into ten different categories (deciles).

In Warrington borough, approximately 19% of residents live in the 20% most deprived areas. Approximately 31% live in the 20% least deprived.




Education – Free School Meals (FSM)

Free School Meals

The Department for Education considers the gap between children who are known to be eligible for Free School Meals (FSM), and other children. Eligibility for FSM is based on being in receipt of certain meanstested benefits. From 1st April 2018 changes have been made by central government, this means that any child with an existing entitlement to free school meals will continue to be eligible until the rollout is completed. The rollout is scheduled to end on 31st March 2025. Once the rollout is completed the child will keep their free school meal entitlement until the end of their current phase of education (i.e. Primary or Secondary). As a result of this protection period FSM eligibility numbers are likely to be higher than previous academic years.

In Warrington

According to the January 2024 School Census, the average proportion of pupils eligible for FSM is **22.71%**. Thirteen out of Warrington's 22 wards fall below the average. The lowest three being Westbrook (7.89%), Grappenhall (7.55%) and Great Sankey North and Whittle Hall (6.56%). Nine wards are above this average. The highest three being Bewsey and Whitecross (41.47%), Orford (41.69%) and Poplars and Hulme (46.42%).

In Bewsey and Whitecross


According to the January 2024 School Census, the average proportion of pupils eligible for FSM in Bewsey and Whitecross is **41.47%** (Warrington: 22.71%). Bewsey and Whitecross is one of 9 wards that are above the Warrington average.



Education – Special Educational Needs (SEN)

Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCP), Statements and SEN Support



In Warrington

The proportion of pupils across Warrington requiring SEN support (not including statements or EHCPs) is **12.38%.** Nine wards are above the Warrington average, the highest being Poulton North (15.14%), Orford (15.43%) and the highest proportion in Poplars and Hulme (17.62%). The proportion of pupils across Warrington with a statement or EHCP is **4.20%.** Nine wards are above the Warrington average, the highest being Poplars and Hulme (5.30%), Orford (5.65%) and the highest proportion in Bewsey and Whitecross (5.69%).


In Bewsey and Whitecross

The proportion of pupils in Bewsey and Whitecross requiring SEN support (not including statements or EHCPs) is **14.66%**, which is above the Warrington average of 12.38%. The proportion of pupils in Bewsey and Whitecross with a statement or EHCP is **5.69%**, which is above the Warrington average of 4.20%.



Education – Ethnic Minorities

In Warrington

According to the January 2024 School Census, the average proportion of pupils who are from an ethnic minority background is 21.08%. The ward with the highest proportion of ethnic minority pupils is Bewsey and Whitecross with 42.04%. The ward with the lowest proportion of ethnic minority pupils is Culcheth, Glazebury & Croft with 8.70%.



In Warrington

Across Warrington, Chinese, Polish and Romanian are the main languages spoken as a first language other than English. Urdu, Kurdish, Chinese (Cantonese), Malayalam and Turkish also featured with 100 or more pupils having these as a first language other than English. The ward with the highest percentage is Bewsey and Whitecross (35.19%) and the ward with the lowest percentage is Culcheth, Glazebury & Croft (2.23%).

In Bewsey and Whitecross


In Bewsey and Whitecross, 35.19% of pupils do not have English as their first language, above the Warrington average (14.52%).



Education (Early Years aged 4/5) – Early Years Foundation Stage

Early Years Foundation Stage Profile (EYFSP)


EYFSP is used to assess a child's overall development by the age of 4/5. As well as literacy and maths, teacher assessments cover a range of elements including personal, social and emotional development, communication skills and physical development. In 2013 there were significant changes to the curriculum in the Early Years Foundation Stage; as a result the data has taken a few years to be considered robust. In 2023, performance for Warrington is above North West, Statistical Neighbour and England average.





The overall measure used is % achieving a Good Level of Development with the proportion for Warrington being 70.1%.

The top 3 performing wards are Rixton and Woolston (82.1%), Great Sankey North & Whittle Hall (82.3%) and the highest being Appleton (83.1%). The lowest 3 performing wards are Fairfield & Howley (59.6%), Orford (59.0%) and the lowest being Latchford West (58%). Twelve of Warrington's wards are above the average and eleven wards are below it with Great Sankey South being the same as the Warrington average (70.1%).




In Bewsey and Whitecross

The percentage achieving a Good Level of Development with the proportion for Bewsey and Whitecross is **59.8%** (Warrington: 70.1%). Bewsey and Whitecross is below the Warrington average.



Education (end of primary school aged 10/11) - Key Stage 2 reading, writing, maths


In 2016, there were also significant changes to how performance is measured at the end of Year 6. There was a new curriculum as well as a much higher test and teacher assessment standard than the previous Level 4. Because of these changes comparing data with previous years is problematic. However, based on the first statistical release from the Department for Education, Warrington is ranked 20th (of 151) in the country and 2nd in the North West (of 24) for Reading, Writing and Maths (RWM) combined. In 2023, Warrington is above the North West average, our Statistical Neighbour average and the England average in all subjects.





In Warrington overall, **68%** of pupils are **achieving the expected standard in RWM** at Key Stage 2.

Eight wards are below the Warrington average with the bottom three being Poplars & Hulme (56.9%), Orford (55.0%) and the lowest being Latchford West (54.4%). Fourteen wards are above the Warrington average with the top three being Penketh & Cuerdley (77.2%), Lymm South (79.8%) and the highest being Chapelford & Old Hall (81.4%).



In Bewsey and Whitecross

In Bewsey and Whitecross, **61.5%** of pupils (Warrington: 68.3%) are achieving the expected standard in RWM at Key Stage 2. Bewsey and Whitecross is below the Warrington average.



Education (end of secondary school aged 15/16) – Key Stage 4: Progress 8

In 2013-14 there were major reforms to Key Stage 4 which affected how results were calculated. Schools and local authorities are now judged on how much progress students have made since the end of primary school. Progress 8 measures the achievement of a pupil across 8 qualifications and compares this to what their estimated achievement is based on their prior attainment. It is a type of value-added measure.

For all mainstream pupils nationally in 2023 the average progress score is -0.03; a positive score means pupils in the schools on average do better at KS4 than those with similar prior attainment nationally. (A score of 0.25 for example would mean that on average pupils in the school achieved a quarter of a grade more than other pupils nationally with similar starting points).

Due to Covid-19, the GCSE exams didn't take place in 2020 and 2021, and this means that the figures for 2020 to 2022 have been assessed differently to other years. Therefore, caution is required before making any direct comparisons.

In Warrington

In Warrington in 2023, the Progress 8 score is -0.08, compared to the North West (-0.20), the Statistical Neighbours figure (-0.10) and the National figure (-0.03).


Warrington is ranked 6th in the North West (out of 24) and 82nd nationally (out of 151 authorities).

Warrington has nine wards with a positive score, with the highest being Lymm South (0.70). Warrington has thirteen wards with a negative score, the lowest being Fairfield and Howley (-0.60).

In Bewsey and Whitecross

Bewsey and Whitecross has a score of **-0.45** and is below the Warrington average (-0.08).







Education (end of secondary school aged 15/16) – Key Stage 4: Attainment 8

Attainment 8 measures the achievement of a pupil across 8 qualifications. It includes Mathematics and English (both double weighted), 3 qualifications that count within the English Baccalaureate (EBacc) measure and a further 3 qualifications that can be GCSE qualifications (including EBacc subjects) or any other non-GCSE qualifications on the DfE approved list. Each individual grade a pupil achieves is assigned a point score, which is then used to calculate a pupil's total Attainment 8 score.

Due to Covid-19, the GCSE exams didn't take place in 2020 and 2021, and this means that the figures for 2020 to 2022 have been assessed differently to other years. Therefore, caution is required before making any direct comparisons.

In Warrington


In Warrington in 2023, the Attainment 8 score is 48.0, the North West figure is 44.6, Warrington is ranked 2nd in the North West (out of 24). The National figure is 46.4, Warrington is ranked 40th out of 151 authorities. Warrington is higher than both the North West and National figures.

Warrington has thirteen wards above the Warrington average with Lymm South being the highest score (60.8). Warrington has nine wards below the Warrington average with Poplars and Hulme being the lowest score (38.8).

In Bewsey and Whitecross

Bewsey and Whitecross has an Attainment 8 score of **43.2** and is below the Warrington average (48.0).


Attainment 8, 2023





Health – life expectancy

Life expectancy is an internationally accepted measure of the overall health of a population. It provides an estimate of the average number of years a new-born baby would live for if s/he experienced the age-specific mortality rates of a particular area throughout his or her life.





In Bewsey and Whitecross

The life expectancy of residents in Bewsey and Whitecross is shorter compared to the Warrington average.

- Male life expectancy (75.4 years) was lower than the Warrington average (79.0 years).
- Female life expectancy (81.5 years) was also lower than the Warrington average (82.4 years).

The UK life expectancy (2018-20) is 79.0 for males and 82.9 for females.




Health – breastfeeding and smoking mothers

Breastfeeding at birth: 59.88% of mothers started breastfeeding their babies at birth, lower than the Warrington average (60.5%).


Breastfeeding at 6-8 weeks: 48.62% of mothers were continuing to breastfeed their babies at 6-8 weeks old, higher than the Warrington average (45.3%).

Smoking at time of delivery (Women who are regular/occasional smokers at time of delivery) is 14.53% and is higher than the Warrington average (10.3%).


Breastfeeding at birth

Health – overweight and obese reception children

Child obesity. Children are measured at the start and end of primary school (in Reception aged 4/5 and in Year 6 aged 10/11). The graphs show the percentage of obese children and the percentage with excess weight (i.e. either overweight or obese). Warrington 2021/22 – 2023/24 - Reception: almost 1 in 10 are obese.

Warrington comparisons: In Reception, overweight/obesity prevalence was higher in Warrington (23.0%) than England (21.9%). Warrington (9.5%) is slightly lower than England (9.6%) in terms of reception age obesity.

In Warrington


The lowest ward in terms of overweight or obese was Lymm South (16.1%) with the highest being Bewsey and Whitecross (30.1%). The lowest ward in terms of obese was Great Sankey North and Whittle Hall (4.1%) with the highest being Poplars and Hulme (13.4%).


Excess Weight (Reception): The proportion of overweight or obese children in Reception (30.1%) for Bewsey and Whitecross is higher than the Warrington average (23.0%).

Obesity (Reception): In Bewsey and Whitecross, obesity prevalence is lower (12.9%) than in Warrington overall (9.5%).

Child obesity. Children are measured at the start and end of primary school (in Reception aged 4/5 and in Year 6 aged 10/11). The graphs show the percentage of obese children and the percentage with excess weight (i.e. either overweight or obese).

Warrington 2021/22 – 2023/24 - Year 6: almost 1 in 4 are obese.

Warrington comparisons: In Year 6, prevalence of obesity, and of overweight/obesity, was lower in Warrington (35.6%) than in England (36.7%).


The lowest ward in terms of overweight or obese was Lymm South (22.2%) with the highest being Fairfield and Howley (45.7%). The lowest ward in terms of obese was Lymm South (9.3%) with the highest being Latchford West (31.7%)

In Bewsey and Whitecross


Excess Weight (Year 6): The proportion of overweight or obese children in Year 6 for Bewsey and Whitecross (44.2%) is higher than the Warrington average (35.6%).

Obesity (Year 6): In Bewsey and Whitecross (30.2%), obesity prevalence is higher compared to 22.0% in Warrington.

Percentage of obese Year 6 children by ward, 2021/22 - 2023/24






Social Care - Children in Need

Children in Need covers children and young people receiving a social care service. This includes those placed on a child protection plan or those looked after by the local authority as a child in care. Children receiving a service under Section 17 are also included to make up a total of approximately 1400 children and young people at 31st January 2024. Numbers were mapped by matching the young person's postcode to each ward. They were then converted to a rate based on the number of 0 -17-year-olds in each ward. The average rate of Children in Need in Warrington was 287.5 per 10,000 population aged 0-17. The highest rates above the Warrington average were in Orford, Bewsey & Whitecross, Latchford East and Poplars & Hulme. The lowest rates were in Grappenhall, Appleton, Culcheth, Glazebury & Croft and Penketh & Cuerdley.



Social Care – Adult Social Care Service Users

Though there are many residents in receipt of adult social care services within the borough, the numbers below represent only those people receiving services paid for in part or wholly by Warrington Borough Council in 2022/23.

The number of service users from the community is approximately 2,500 and the number of service users in residential or nursing care is approximately 800. The number of service users are then converted to percentages based on the 2021 Census populations.

*Some wards' percentages relate to relatively small numbers and should be treated with caution.





In Bewsey and Whitecross



Warrington had an anti-social behaviour rate of 10.55 per 1,000 population in the year to October 2023.


In Bewsey and Whitecross

Bewsey and Whitecross had an anti-social behaviour rate of 40.74 per 1,000 of the ward population. Bewsey and Whitecross is 1 of 6 wards above the Warrington average and has the highest rate in Warrington.




Universal Credit – December 2023

Bewsey and Whitecross has 28.82% of its working age population (16-64) claiming Universal Credit as of December 2023. Bewsey and Whitecross is one of 7 wards above the Warrington average.




Universal Credit – 24 month rolling period to December 2023

In Warrington

The percentage of the working age population (16-64) claiming Universal Credit has increased from 12.5% in January 2022 to over 14% at December 2023.

In Bewsey and Whitecross

The percentage of the working age population (16-64) claiming Universal Credit has increased from 23.7% in January 2022 to 28.8% at December 2023. Bewsey & Whitecross has been consistently above the Warrington level during the previous two years.
