Introduction

The aim of the HAF programme is to make free holiday club places and nutritious food available to children eligible for benefit related free school meals, during the Easter, Summer, and Christmas holidays. The programme has been operating in Warrington since April 2021.

Research has shown that the school holidays can be pressure points for some families. For some children that can lead to a holiday experience gap.

Children from low-income households are:

- less likely to access organised out-ofschool activities
- more likely to experience 'unhealthy holidays' in terms of nutrition and physical health
- · more likely to experience social isolation

The HAF programme is a response to this issue. Evidence shows that free holiday clubs can have a positive impact on children and young people.

They work best when they:

- provide consistent and easily accessible enrichment activities
- cover more than just breakfast or lunch
- involve children and parents in food preparation
- use local partnerships and connections, particularly with the VCSO sector


The HAF programme funding is primarily for school aged children from reception to year 11 (inclusive) who receive benefits-related free school meals (FSM). Local authorities have discretion to use up to 15% of their funding to provide free or subsidised holiday club places for children who are not in receipt of benefits-related FSM but who the local authority believe could benefit from HAF.





What do we know about Warrington children and free school meals?

As of January 2024, 7,356 children in Warrington were eligible for free school meals. Every year, we map our provision to show the number of children that are HAF eligible against the provision on offer. The red circles show the areas with the highest density of free school meals, whilst the green diamonds represent a HAF club. The map shows that we have HAF provision in all the areas of need.

Outcomes


- Data sharing agreement in place with the free school meals team, and an updated privacy policy was developed with Information Governance.
- Centralised booking system now in place, which enables parents to search and book in one place, produces accurate attendance reports, automatically checks eligibility against the FSM list, and enables the HAF coordinator to approve any non-FSM places at the point of booking.
- Support from the Early Years Funding manager to help providers become OFSTED registered. Three clubs registered with OFSTED in 2024.
- Support offered for families that are not HAF eligible in the form of signposting them to Tax Free Childcare, claiming back childcare costs through Universal Credit and directing them to HAF clubs offering paid places at a reduced rate.
- HAF is linked to the Eat Well, Feel Well Strategy, which launched in the summer.



Attendance




These figures represent the number of unique children who attended at least one session during each holiday period. Although there was a dip in the unique attendance numbers for Easter and Summer 2024, this is attributed to improved data accuracy. During these periods, we introduced cross-referencing to ensure each child was counted only once, even if they attended multiple clubs. In Winter 2024, we launched a new centralised booking system, which verifies eligibility, tracks the number of unique attendees, and prevents duplicate bookings.




During the Winter programme, we trialled the 2 by 2 model where each provider delivered two in-person sessions in the form of a holiday club. As part of the remote offer, families received nutritious food hampers and pantomime tickets to support engagement and enrichment at home.

This was such a fantastic idea. We enjoyed collecting the hampers, opening them to look through the ingredients and following the recipes. We chose the Curry. I have never made a curry without meat, all the family enjoyed it so we will definitely make this again. Thank you.



With a focus on developing the offer for children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), 29% of attendees declared SEND in summer. We saw an increase of 151% for the secondary aged range for Winter 2024 in comparison to Winter 2023. We know that this is due to our new partnerships with Padgate Academy and Beamont Collegiate Academy, as well as the offer of food hampers, which were appealing to this age range, rather than a traditional style holiday club.



Case Studies

St Joseph's Family Centre

We welcomed a new HAF provider in the summer; St Joseph's Family Centre, who offered outstanding provision to children at Sacred Heart Primary School, St Barnabus Primary School and St Andrews CE Primary School. The centre is a Warrington based charity that has been supporting vulnerable families for decades, so they already have a good relationship with local schools.

Centre manager, Joanne Wilkison said

We're so proud to see the HAF Holiday Club run by St Joseph's is leaving a lasting impression on families, children, and school staff at the end of our first year of provision. Having offered emergency welfare support to local families for many years, it seemed a natural progression for us to add the HAF scheme to our service provision. Not only can we offer a safe, nurturing environment to help alleviate concerns around holiday childcare and provision of healthy, nutritious meals. We also extend our welfare support to the whole family with the provision of food parcels, low-cost meal recommendations, toiletries and children's clothing for anyone requiring a little extra support.

One of the most telling signs of the programme's success is the eagerness of children to attend the clubs. We've received so much positive feedback around children having fun and enjoying the diverse range of activities



offered as well as comments relating to the outstanding support we provide for children with additional needs who may not always enjoy a change in routine or prefer quieter spaces and activities. From sports, arts and crafts, cooking and baking, educational workshops and a forest school, the team of dedicated staff and volunteers provide an array of experiences that cater to so many different interests and needs.

The incredible success of the HAF Holiday Club at St Joseph's Family Centre highlights the importance of providing engaging and supportive environments for children during the school holidays. The overwhelmingly positive feedback from families, the enthusiasm of children, and the commendations from school staff all underscore the programme's significant impact. We can't wait to do it all again at Summer!

Computer Xplorers

Computer Xplorers have been delivering HAF since 2021 and are now an established and trusted provider in the area. They offer specialist computing classes across a variety of settings, including after-school clubs, in-school workshops, nursery sessions, holiday and weekend camps, and special events. Their mission is to inspire a love of computing in children, wherever they are. To maximise participation, the club strategically overbooks sessions, a practice that has proven effective - achieving an impressive 98% attendance rate during the summer.



Match Funding

Active SEN

A huge thanks to Active SEN, who kindly gifted us with a grant of £500 to support our SEND HAF offer. This was used by Warrington Play and Sensory Centre to fund an extra HAF session for families with children that have complex needs. The centre worked in partnership with Warrington wolves to deliver family sessions in a safe and secure environment. Active Cheshire

Rylands FC secured £3850 of funding from Active Cheshire on behalf of the police and crime commissioner. Longford in Warrington was identified as an area of need due to the high rates of serious youth violence. They enhanced their HAF offer by offering places to Year 6 children transitioning to high school in the area. After attending, young people were encouraged to sign up to Rylands FC free weekend sessions and the club offered signposting information. Andrew Hibbert, Rylands FC HAF manager said 'We had 12 young people attend during the summer and the feedback we received was very positive. All young people were given tickets to attend future matches, and we have seen some of them at recent home games which is a positive, showing they have a new interest in live sport which will hopefully lead to more participation in future.'

Oral Health

As part of the Cheshire and Merseyside 'All Together Smiling' programme, which aims to improve oral health in 2-7 year olds in the region, we partnered with our local Public Health team to give out 1000 toothbrushes, toothpaste and information leaflets to children attending a holiday club in summer and winter. HAF Providers were given oral health resources to promote good oral health habits, model regular effective tooth brushing and educate the children about healthy eating.

Bikeability

We partnered with Bike Right, who utilised Bikeability funding over the summer to provide HAF activities at a reduced cost. Through this partnership, Bike Right secured £2,184 in funding. They also delivered a successful 'Learn to Ride' session at the Children's Centre, where children were taught to ride bikes independently, without stabilisers.


Morrisons



Overall, how would you rate the Warrington Holiday Activities and Food programme this summer?





What were your main reasons for booking a place(s) on the Warrington Holiday and Food (HAF) programme for summer 2024?
